Welcome back to *the buzz*, our monthly cannabis news and policy update. Your at-a-glance source for regulatory developments, agency announcements, and trends impacting the cannabis industry.

In this edition of the buzz, highlights include:

- Rescheduling roadblock: Will spending bill block the DOJ from using funds on rescheduling?
- 280E strikes again: US Tax Court restricts QBI deduction benefits—WA cannabis businesses owe nearly \$1M
- New markets opening: RI accepts applications for 24 adult-use retail licenses to be awarded through lottery; NE about to launch medical program with 60% potency caps
- Around the states: CA Gov. New Newsom reduces state cannabis tax from 19% to 15% through 2028. NY proposes new rules for advertising, packaging, and labeling
- Upcoming cannabis ballot measures: in MA (repealing adult-use market); MO (combine cannabis + hemp); OR (legalize social consumption site).
- Hemp updates: VA Rep Griffith proposed new framework to regulate hemp-derived cannabinoid products under FDA/DHS. TX Gov. Abbott moves forward on regulating hemp and incorporating hemp beverages into alcohol supply chain. MD appeals court OKs requiring cannabis licenses for higher-THC hemp products.
